Meeting Ground operates **Clairvaux Farm**, near Earleville, Maryland, a 20-acre place of refuge for the homeless--including families with children, women and men and **Wayfarers' House** in Elkton, MD--a residence for women and women with children; and **George Porter House** in Elkton, a transitional home for women and men. The herbs are grown and processed at Clairvaux Farm and packaged at Wayfarers' House for the benefit of all who are part of the continuing community. ## 350 Years More

One of the goals of the Mission and Outreach committee is to see how we can invite our friends and members of our community to become a part of our church. On a Saturday morning in September, I went to a lecture at 1st and Central Presbyterian Church to listen to a lecture given by Diana Butler Bass, the author of **Christianity for the Rest of Us--How the Neighborhood Church is Transforming the Faith**. This book is based on research that she conducted with 50 congregations throughout the United States. In her words, "The 50 congregations involved in my study were not usually the largest in their towns--- Rather they were solid, healthy churches that exhibited ways of living with passion and purpose." These were moderate, mainline congregations that she felt the media was not paying enough attention to or giving much press to either. She expressed concern that the only articles she could find were about conservative, evangelical Protestantism and that they did not convey the truth about religious practice in America. As she wryly commented, "There is not a one-party religion in America."

Of greater interest, though, was her explanation of the 10 practices of vital mainline denominations that are listed below. "Lots of churches do struggle, she says. Some are closing. But there are remarkable pockets of vitality pointing the way to renewal." The good news is that you don't have to have all these practices in play at once. Look at your church honestly, develop the practices you already have working for you, and add new practices when you can. This study was funded by the Lilly Endowment.

1) "**Hospitality** is not to change people, but to offer them space where change can take place," say renowned Catholic priest and writer Henri Nouwen. An overarching welcoming spirit of hospitality ranked as one of the strongest practices.

2) **Discernment**, listening for truth with one's heart, is a church process, not just a personal one. A perilous and enlivening practice that involves self-criticism, questions and risk.

3) **Healing** that is not flaky or idiosyncratic is a key theme in contemporary spirituality, growing more dominant as the population ages.

4) **Silence**, meditation and contemplation have new followings. Many churches practice silence at board meetings, prayer meetings, Bible Studies, labyrinth walks, yoga classes and discernment groups.

5) **Testimony** is among the most democratic and empowering of practices. It's a way for everyday Christians to attest to what early Christians knew--the transformative power of God.

6) **Diversity** is celebrated. Christians elevate unity-in-diversity and seek to avoid shunning, schism, crusades, heresy trials and religious warfare.

7) **Justice** is a spirit of fairness that seeks to engage the powers that be, transforming the "inner spirit" of systems of injustice, violence and exclusion. Justice is sought through the linking of hands-on service, mission and activism.

8) **Worship** need not be a subject of warfare of contemporary vs. traditional ways. The enlivening approach is to discover how people can "experience God" together.

9) **Reflection** is a means of engaging heart and mind, not pitting them against each other. Emerging churches are not afraid to question the gap between human knowledge and God. It is an essential part of the pilgrimage.

10) **Beauty** is a faith practice, though it has not always been the strong suit of Protestantism, which has struggled between the poles of rationalism and mysticism, with rationalism often winning. Creativity has a new place of honor in churches today.

When people are talking about old times, invariably they will start a story by saying, "I Remember When" and go on from there. I hope every person in the congregation, young and old, will share at least one or more such memories.

They may be a sentence or two, or a paragraph, but no more than a page in length. As an example, the following story is based on a short conversation I had some time ago with the late Frances Gebhart Dunlap:

*"I became a member of the New Castle Presbyterian Church when I was twelve years old, and my husband and I were married in the brownstone church building in September 1930. I remember that it was a beautiful building inside and there was a red carpet. The pastor, Dr. William Drysdale Gibson, performed the ceremony. No pictures were made of our ceremony because the Elders would not allow pictures to be made inside the building. The Elders were very straitlaced back then."*

Some Memory Prodders for your stories:

Former Sunday school teachers, former pastors, elders, deacons, trustees, youth groups, women's groups, or some of the members you especially remember; amusing stories, picnics, trips, special events or projects, Christmas time; "outside" speakers, the brownstone church building, demolishing the brownstone, building the Christian education building, restoration of the meeting house, life in the manse; the New Castle Antiques Show, weddings, funerals, paintings in the CE building, tennis courts behind the meeting house, etc., etc. Anything goes!!

## **350<sup>th</sup> ANNIVERSARY CELEBRATION DECEMBER 2006 THROUGH DECEMBER 2007**

The 350<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Mission Project:

The congregation will be partnering with Calvary Presbyterian Church on Maryland Avenue and with the Friendship House in Wilmington to assist them in creating a Level II homeless shelter for men in a house owned by Calvary Presbyterian Church.

### **DECEMBER 2006**

- On Saturday, December 9, 2006 as part of the Spirit of Christmas historical items will be displayed in cases in the CE Building and commemorative items will be for sale. The Anniversary Quilt will be on display. The outside banner announcing the 350<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the church will be displayed and the pamphlet highlighting the history of the church and announcing the 350<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Celebration will be available.
- On Sunday Evening, December 31, 2006, at 5:30 p.m., there will be a New Year's Eve Progressive Dinner followed by a Church Service where the 350<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Quilt will be installed on the balcony in the Meeting House.

### **JANUARY 2007**

- Historical vignettes will begin appearing in the Church Newsletter each month and historical vignettes will appear in the Church Bulletin two times a month.
- On Sunday, January 7, 2007 at the 11:00 a.m. service, the congregation will sing the new hymn by the Rev. Carolyn Gillette of Limestone Presbyterian Church, written especially for the 350<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Celebration.

### **FEBRUARY 2007**

- On Sunday Morning, February 4, 2007 at the 11:00 p.m. service, there will be a special emphasis on the music and the church service format as it would have occurred in the Meeting House in the 1600s.
- On Sunday Evening, February 25, 2007, at 7:00 p.m. in the Meeting House there will be a seminar on the history of Protestantism in the 17 and 18<sup>th</sup> centuries with speaker Carol Hoffecker, a retired history professor from the University of Delaware. Following the presentation refreshments will be served in the C.E. Building.

## **MARCH 2007**

- On Sunday Evening, March 18, 2007 at 6:00 p.m., there will be a special Family Night Supper and program. The Program will include an interview with Ralph Johnson and others on their memories of the history of the New Castle Presbyterian Church.

## **APRIL 2007**

- On Sunday Morning, April 22, 2007 at the 11:00 a.m. service our new anthem by Michael Larkin of the NewArk Chorale, written especially for the 350<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Celebration, will be presented.
- On Sunday Evening April 22, 2007 at 7:00 p.m. there will be a second seminar on the history of Presbyterianism locally with speaker Russ McCabe, Director of the Delaware State Archives. Following the presentation refreshments will be served in the C.E. Building.

## **MAY 2007**

- On Saturday, May 19, 2007 during a "Day in Old New Castle" historical items will be on display in cases in the CE Building, commemorative items will be for sale and our Meeting House will be open for tours.
- On Tuesday, May 22, 2007 from 9:30 a.m. the New Castle Presbyterian Church will host the May meeting of the New Castle Presbytery which has been in existence for 300 years.

## **JUNE 2007**

- On Saturday, June 9, 2007 during the "Separation Day" activities our Meeting House will be open for tours and information on the 350<sup>th</sup> Anniversary celebration will be available.
- On Sunday Evening, June 3, 2007, there will be a third seminar on historical issues. Bill Quillen, retired Superior Court Judge will talk about the life of Judge George Gray a New Castle resident who was a candidate for nomination for the office for President of the United States at the Democratic National Convention in the early 1900's. Following the presentation refreshments will be served in the C.E. Building.
- On Sunday Morning, June 10, 2007, following the 10:00 a.m. worship service the church will celebrate its 350<sup>th</sup> Birthday with a picnic complete with a cake, balloons and games.

## **JULY and AUGUST 2007**

- On Sunday Morning, July 1, 2007 at our 10:00 a.m. service, there will be a special emphasis on the music and the church service format as it would have occurred in the Meeting House in 1776.
- There will be a 350<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Mission project for the Church youth.

## **SEPTEMBER 2007**

- On Sunday Evening, September 23, 2007 at 6:00 p.m., there will be a special Family Night Supper and program. The program will focus on the renovations in 1950 to our historic Meeting House.
